St. Francis' Juniors Go Farming



In June the children in Year 3 and Year 4 of St. Francis' Junior School were invited to visit Bowlee's Educational Farm in Barnard Castle. The children and staff had an amazing time with Jemma the farmer. We got to meet Tina Turner, a pet lamb that Jemma has been hand feeding due to Tina's mam not being able to feed her herself, Jemma told us that Tina Turner has become a member of the family and joins them in the house, on occasion for a cuddle from Brandy the dog, who Tina thinks is her sister! We also met the farm chickens who also joined us for lunch.

We started the day off collecting feed and having a lovely run through the meadow fields full of beautiful wild flowers, Jemma explained that they were letting them grow to be made into hay and some of the wild flowers were rare and being donated to another field to hopefully produce more of the rare wild flowers. They children enjoyed running and jumping through the meadow with the farm dog Brandy, who was eager to have a stick or two thrown for her. The children were so patient and kind to Brandy. On our walk through the meadow we came across some sheep and their lambs. We gave them their breakfast and learned about their coats and diets. They were a bit smelly, but it is all part of being on the farm. We also came to another field full of 'OAP' sheep, these sheep were older or poorly, they had been retired, their retirement home was beautiful, surrounded by water and wild flowers sounds like a great place to rewind and retire from sheep life. Jemma explained how important it was for farmers to check their animals every day for injury or illness. At the bottom of the field was a bridge going over the river tees, we collected some sticks and played 'Pooh Sticks' to see who had collected the best stick to float down the river. We also explored the river banks for fossils and found some amazing fossils. After our visit to the river bank we had a stroll through the woods, Jemma told us these were very famous

trees and wildlife that lived in the woods.

there, how exciting. We learned about lots of different

trees, we hugged them and made a wish before going to feed Ronnie and Reggie the pigs. We got to stroke the pigs, some children were shocked at how rough they felt.

We were getting hungry, but before we could stop for lunch we had to go and feed Oscar, a 17-hand horse, he was such a gentle horse that likes a nose scratch. We left Oscar to his feed before heading to feed the calf's, we got to give them a little head scratch. After a spot of lunch (farming is hard work) we went to the barn and met Happy the sheep and her lamb. We got to hand feed them and feel how thick Happy's coat was. Happy was very friendly, Jemma made sure the children knew they can't just go to an animal in the wild and stroke or feed them. When Happy and Bow, her lamb, had been fed, Jemma walked Vanilla and Milkshake, two goats, for a feed. We learnt all about how to care for goats and how important it is to not overfeed them.

For our last exciting activity we got to meet the farm guinea pigs and Peter the rabbit. We fed them some yummy lettuce and got to hear them squeak for more! We then had to get back on the bus to school after a fun filled, exciting day on the farm.

Happiness Hub Grant Scheme

The Pioneering Care Partnership (PCP) is calling for applications from organisations that want to offer a safe space and activities for local people to meet and be supported.

Over £877,000 has been donated to local organisations wanting to create a better environment for local people since the scheme began in 2020.

Kelly Spence, Mental Health Co-ordinator at PCP, said: "I am excited to announce that grants of £500 to £7,500 are available to community organisations and groups in County Durham from the Happiness Hubs grant scheme. #WeARElistening

Summer 2024 marks the launch of a new campaign for Sisters Of Support, amidst all of the negativity in the media, uncertainty in the world and the worst cost of living crisis since the second world war, people's mental health is at an all-time low.

Women are often seen as the care givers who have it all figured out. It is perceived that women talk to one another about the issues they face and therefore do not struggle as much, when in fact that could not be further from the truth. Women, more



so than men, will mask their feelings and emotions, shoving everything deep down in the hope it will go away, over the years, women have learned that to survive in this world they must not fail, they must not show weakness and therefore when asked "Is everything OK?" the chances are she will tell you 'yes'. According to a study conducted by MQmentalhealth.org - 1 in 7 UK adults say their mental health is currently either bad, or the worst it's ever been. More women than men are currently struggling with poor mental health (18.5% of women v 12.5% of men).

Sisters Of Support want to end that stereotype once and for all. We hear so much now, in the media, about men's mental health (which is amazing and about time) that there is this assumption that women are OK and are being left behind a little. We are here to tell you #WeARElistening, sometimes just getting things off your chest is a powerful therapy, feeling heard and understood is so important, it is good to talk yes, but unless you feel heard, you are not likely to make a healthy habit of speaking about things you struggle with.

Sisters Of Support would like to ask that you check on your female friends, ask them are they really OK? Give them the space and comfort to open up to you and let's get as many women in County Durham as possible to say **#WeARElistening**.



Students Visit Walworth Castle

On Tuesday 4th June, Year 5 students from Walworth School in Newton Aycliffe came for a tour of Walworth Castle Hotel in preparation for Restaurant Day at their School. Walworth School is a specialist school for children with social, emotional and mental health difficulties. The school gets its name as historically, the school was placed within Walworth Castle before it became a hotel.

The teachers within the school work hard to teach both an academic curriculum as well as practical life skills such as cooking. The year 5 class have been taking part in weekly cooking lessons to prepare for their Restaurant Day when they will be inviting their parents and carers in to school and cooking them a three course meal. The class will be split between waiting staff and a cooking team. Mr Barnes wanted to show the children how working in a Restaurant happened in real life and organised a trip to Walworth Castle.

Ashley, the Restaurant Manager, took the children on a tour of the Castle and chatted to the pupils about how they could run their own restaurant. Ashley showed the students how to take orders and give them to the kitchen, how to work the tills and how to set up their tables ready for their own special day.

The children brought along their packed lunches and dined in the 1189 Restaurant, as if they were customers, to get a feel of what it would be like to dine in there. Ashley then took the children to the kitchens to meet Claire, the hotels sous chef, and the children were able to chat with her and ask lots of questions about working in a kitchen.

Ashley showed the students around the King James Suite bedroom and they had a tour of the Dungeons and discussed all of the ghosts rumoured to walk the hotels.

The children enjoyed a fantastic day visiting Walworth Castle.

Durham Brass Festival On The Road



One of the region's best-loved music events is once again going on the road when it makes its eagerly-awaited return next month. Durham Brass Festival 2024 will include the Big and Little Brass Bashes that bring the party to outdoor spaces across County Durham. The big and little bashes, that have proven so popular in previous years, are a series of ten free events offering energetic and eclectic performances from thrilling street bands.

They reflect festival-organiser Durham County Council's desire to ensure people can enjoy arts and culture, free of charge, wherever they

The fun begins with two Little Brass Bashes on Monday 8th July at Haswell pit site and Spennymoor marketplace, both from 6pm to 8pm. The first of four Big Brass Bash events takes place on Tuesday 9th July at Glenholme Park in Crook, with this and all other Big Brass Bashes running from 6pm to 9pm. A new Little Brass Bash takes place at Chester-le-Street marketplace the same day, from 6pm to 9pm. Big Brass Bashes will continue in Hackworth Park, Shildon on Wednesday 10th and Newton Aycliffe Town Park on Thursday 11th July, with Willington hosting a Little Brass Bash on the Town Green on Wednesday 10th July, from 6.30pm to 8.30pm.

In a first for Durham Brass Festival, a Little Brass Bash will take place in Barnard Castle on Thursday 11th July at The Witham, again from 6.30pm to 8.30pm.

And the party will come to an end on the final night of Bashes on Friday 12th July with a Big Brass Bash at Trimdon Community College and another new Little Brass Bash in Middle Street, Consett, from 6pm to

This year's festival takes place from Friday 5th to Saturday 13th July and, as ever, promises a week of spectacular performances, new commissions, free concerts, community activities, and a full programme of lively street bands.

Brass opens with Public Service Broadcasting performing their album Every Valley with The NASUWT Riverside Band to a sold-out audience at Durham Cathedral.

There'll be more free outdoor events as the popular Streets of Brass takes place across Durham on Saturday 6th and Sunday 7th July. These will run from 11am to 4pm and 11am to 5pm respectively, with the Sunday including the ever-popular Streets of Brass finale in the marketplace from 4.30pm. Party In The Park at the city's Wharton Park returns on Saturday 7th July, from 5pm to 9pm.

The festival line-up is completed with The Cory Band and Durham Miners' Association Brass Band teaming up for King Kong at Gala Durham on Sunday 7th July; the emerging artist showcase Brassed On at Durham Town Hall on the same day; and Smoove & Turrell's Northern Coal Experience DJ set at the same venue on Friday 12th

Durham Brass Festival is a key part of Durham County Council's festivals and events programme, which also includes the UK's light art biennial Lumiere and yearly food festivals at Seaham and Bishop Auckland.

This programme cements Durham's position as the 'Culture County' and reflects the local authority's commitment to culture-led regeneration. This commitment includes delivering key projects within the bid that saw Durham become the first county ever to be shortlisted for UK City of Culture; progressing major capital projects; and raising the county's profile as a fantastic place to live, work, visit and invest. Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report



Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, put in a fighting performance, but were eventually defeated by three wickets at home to Redcar 1st XI in the NYSD second division. Asked to bat first, Aycliffe were bowled out for a below par 155 after 38.4 overs. Chris Palmer top scored with 37 off 45 balls and his innings took him past the noteable landmark of 11,000 runs for Newton Aycliffe. Adam Gittins also batted well with 29 off 63 balls and captain James Layfield-Carroll chipped in with a belligerent 24 off 25 balls, including two boundaries and two sixes. In reply, Aycliffe made the visitors battle hard for every run, but they eventually reached their winning target after 44.4 overs despite some good bowling from Leo Mercy (sponsored by Yvonne and Bob Wood), who took 2 for 24 and Luke Telford (2 for 52).

The second team put in their best performance of the season to win a tough game by 34 runs, away at Yarm 2nd XI in the NYSD fourth division. Aycliffe were asked to bat first and were thankful for an excellent 2nd wicket partnership of 97 between Matty Greaves (50 off 71 balls) and Matty French (24 off 74 balls) to give their innings some genuine substance. It was Greaves (sponsored by Athena Sports Academy) first half century since 2020 and it included seven boundaries. Aycliffe then suffered a dramatic collapse, losing their next nine wickets for just 32 runs with only 15 year old Will Dearden showing any resilience with a fighting 12 not out off 25 balls. When Yarm replied, the young four pronged Aycliffe attack bowled superbly to defend the small total and dismiss the homeside for just 95 off 37.4 overs. Eighteen year old Ramzan Hussain finished with career best figures of 4 for 19 and was supported well by both 19 year old Matty Greaves (3 for 29) and 15 year old Will Dearden (2 for 13). The youngest member of the teenage quartet, 14 year old Will Moffatt took his first senior wicket to finish an impressive nine over spell with figures of 1 for 26 to help Aycliffe to their first victory of the season. The club's Ladies team had another brilliant win with a true all round team performance as they defeated Rockliffe Park away by 45 runs in the Hambleton League. Batting first, the Aycliffe ladies all performed well with five individual players reaching double figures. Tina Masterman continued her amazing form when she again top scored, this time with an unbeaten 16 off 11 balls and other useful contributions came from Addison Jones (12 not out off 11 balls) and Louise Jackson (12 off 11 balls). In reply, Rockliffe were pegged back by some tight bowling and fielding with six players taking at least one wicket leaving the homeside well short of their winning target.

Our U17's put in their best performance of the season to comfortably beat Stockton away by 8 wickets in the quarter final of the NYSD Plate cup competition. Stockton elected to bat first and reached 126 for 3 in their 20 overs with Will Dearden, Tom Norman and Leo Stout sharing the three wickets that fell. In reply, superb innings by both captain Tom Dearden (51 retired off 38 balls) and Ramzan Hussain (55 retired off 36 balls) put Aycliffe firmly in the driving seat and then Adam Shaw (10 not out) and Liam Scott (4 not out) safely guided Aycliffe home to an excellent victory after 17.2 overs.

The U11's had a terrific win by 58 runs at home to Norton to move up to 4th place in the NYACC League. Morgan Jones top scored with an unbeaten 15 off 14 balls and Gracie Hayman also batted well with 12 not out off 15 balls. In reply, Aycliffe's Lydia Myers bowled superbly, taking two wickets and not conceding any runs from her three overs. Nial Hadland (2 for 3) and Carys Myers (1 for 6) also bowled well to help their team to a comfortable victory.



GCSE Further Mathematics is a staple of the curriculum at Greenfield Academy. Our key value 'Ambition' is intertwined with mathematics: each driving the other, pushing children to mastery and remarkable achievements.

Further Mathematics GCSE is designed for children who excel in maths to extend their understanding beyond the standard GCSE. Claire Middleton, Associate Assistant Headteacher and Maths teacher, explained: "Offering our children the opportunity to challenge themselves is essential for developing their problem-solving skills and analytical thinking. On the weekend of June 22nd/23rd 2024, Newton Aycliffe based kart racer Scarlet Whitaker Dunn attended Teesside Autodrome for round 3 of the Teesside Sprint

She was racing in the highly competitive Honda Cadet 200cc class on what turned out to be a swelteringly hot weekend of racing. Despite struggling with diminishing grip, due to the high track

temperature, Scarlet achieved her best qualifying position to date since joining the Honda Cadet class, a very credible 9th place in a 28 kart

What a nail biting 1st race! Scarlet made a tremendous start followed by many track position changes throughout the race. Scarlet was delighted with her best ever 9th place race finish within this class. Race 2 started well with Scarlet making a great get away from the line. She had soon progressed from 9th to 7th place, where she stayed until a clumsy challenge from a fellow competitor, just 90 seconds from the end of the race, caused Scarlet and her kart to be spun out on turn one. Despite this, Scarlet managed to get going again and to bring her kart home in 19th place, but her disappointment was obvious for what could have been.

Race 3 saw Scarlet make her way through the field from 19th to 15th place before the race was red flagged and cut short.

In the final race of the day, Scarlet made great progress fighting her way toward the front. Although, whilst in 11th place, she was unfortunate to catch up with a much slower back marker in the middle of a double hairpin section (causing her to have to slow her kart much more than she would normally have to) resulting in the driver of the kart following her to be caught out and unable to stop without running into Scarlet. The following kart rode over Scarlet's rear wheel, launching the kart over her own, skimming over her helmet in the process. Courageously, Scarlet kept her foot down and her 'passenger' came off and she was able to bring her kart home in a still creditable 16th place. Although Scarlet was disappointed to have not finished better, despite her best efforts, there was still much to be celebrated as the team have now got the kart running strongly, giving Scarlet a platform to compete from, for the rest of the Teesside Sprint Series.

"Whilst I experienced some setbacks, I was very proud to be at a better pace during this weekend," said Scarlet. "It was great to see Scarlet's race pace and race craft this weekend," said Mam.
