A167 Major Road Works

Work has begun to deliver improvements to the A167's Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions, and at the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout. Rushford roundabout work is due to be completed by mid September 2024.



In July 2024 work will commence to improve the A167 Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions. It will provide additional road capacity in the area, and potentially allow the development of up to 1400 new homes on the Low Copelaw site to the east of the town.

Work that will be completed:

Durham County Council are widening the roads to the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout and improving its layout. They will start work at the A167's Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions in early July 2024 and expect to finish by Spring 2025.

The work at the A167's Central Avenue junction will provide a new link road providing access to the future housing site, as well as a traffic light-controlled entry, improved pedestrian crossings and road resurfacing. This junction will be closed from 15th July 2024 while this work is ongoing.

DCC are also adding new traffic lights at the A167's Ricknall Lane junction, improved pedestrian crossings and resurfacing the road. This junction will be closed from mid-September 2024. They will maintain access to the Premier Inn and The Gretna Green.

Diversions

Diversions for vehicles will be in place during specific construction phases and these will be signposted. Local pedestrian and cyclist diversions also will be in place and signposted.

Although some disruption is inevitable, the County Council are doing everything possible to minimise the impact to businesses and residents.

Funding

This scheme has been funded to the tune of £7million from the Government's Housing Infrastructure Fund (HIF) to deliver the scheme, which is scheduled for completion Summer 2025.









NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING By PCSO Steven Kipli

The Neighbourhood & Response teams working out of Newton Aycliffe have been busy responding to a variety of incidents across the area over the past week, here's a very brief update of what has been happening;

Officers executed a Magistrates Search Warrant at an address in Newton Aycliffe, and a large quantity of drugs and cash were seized, with one male arrested at the scene. On Monday, a male was arrested on suspicion of possessing indecent images. Also on Monday, a male was arrested on suspicion of assault following a domestic related incident.

Response and neighbourhood officers responded to a report of a suicidal female. Fortunately, officers located the female within minutes, safe and well and is now receiving the appropriate support.

PCSO Kipling attended the North East Autism Society to speak with the students around Road Safety, and then conducted some Speedwatch checks on the A167 with the help of the students.

On Wednesday, PCSO's Todd and Kipling attended the Shopwatch meeting, along with representatives from our local shops. Also on Wednesday, Sgt Boyd chaired a steering group meeting looking at the creation of a new Community Hub in the town centre. The group have identified a property, surveys are being completed, and funding applied for. This work is in collaboration with a number of partner agencies including Lifeline Community Action.

On Friday night, a male was arrested following a report of a domestic related incident and was transported to custody. On Saturday, PCSO's Kipling and Todd seized an off-road bike that had been causing a nuisance to the public. On Sunday afternoon we had the pleasure of attending the Middridge Summer Fair. Pupils Prepare for 'Superhero Walk'

Pupils and staff from a North East specialist school are donning costumes from comics and films for a sponsored climb of Roseberry Topping to raise money for their class.

Class 6 from Aycliffe School, run by the North East Autism Society (NEAS), will take on a 'Superhero Walk' to the 1,049 foot summit of the iconic landmark on 17th July.

The young people in class 6, aged 15-16, as well as staff from the school, hope to raise money for free time resources to help pupils relax and socialise in the classroom between lessons.

Judith Gibbons, class 6's teacher at Aycliffe School, said: "Especially during the winter months, when they can't always get outside for breaks, pupils get to play together, and it brings everyone together as a class with common interests."

Rhys, a pupil in class 6, added: "It's entertainment and it builds friendships."

The class has been preparing for the trek with regular wellbeing walks in parks around the region, including South Park in Darlington, Hardwick Hall Country Park, and the Tees Barrage.

Judith said: "We find, as a class, walking is good for our general wellbeing, fitness, and mental health. That led to the idea that we'll walk up Roseberry Topping, and we felt that if we were walking up Roseberry Topping, we should do it to raise money."

Pupils were inspired by other fundraising efforts, and the idea of completing the trek in fancy dress began as a joke about Judith and class 6 pupil Luke dressing up as Batman and Robin for the climb. The joke soon became a way to promote the event, and grew into the planned theme of a superhero walk, with costumes donated by a local provider.

"As a class we generally like Marvel and superheroes. It's a popular topic for the class and kind of fits with everyone's personalities," Judith said. She added: "We got a lot of attention just being out and about in the costumes, I think the reaction's going to be really supportive now that people know about it."

As well as planning the walk, class 6 are also promoting it themselves as part of an ongoing work experience project with NEAS' marketing team.

Pupils learned about branding and designed a class logo and poster for the event, which they have put up around Newton Aycliffe.

An alternative route will be available to vehicular traffic from the eastern side of the closure from A167 south to the junction with St Cuthberts Way, then westerly and northerly to the junction with Horndale Avenue a) Then northerly on \$t\$ Cuthberts Way to the roundabout junction with Central Avenue b) HGV route turning west onto Horndale Avenue to the Peases Way/ Greenfield Avenue roundabout, and taking Greenfield Way road north easterly and turning north easterly on Burnhill Way and south easterly on Burn Lane to the junction with Central Avenue to the western side of the closure, and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence on 15/7/24 and are anticipated to be completed in 29 weeks. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed on site accordingly.

Durham Cathedral Achieve Accreditation

The Museum, which is set within the buildings of the medieval monastery of Durham, is located just off the cathedral cloister and explores 2000 vears of the North East's history, culture and faith. The fascinating spaces, which make up the Museum, enable visitors to get up close to ancient items such as the Treasures of St Cuthbert and the original Sanctuary Ring.
Administered by Arts Council England on behalf of the UK Accreditation Partnership, Accreditation is the benchmark for well-run Museums and Galleries. It means that Durham Cathedral Museum is properly managed and governed to the nationally agreed industry standard and shows the museum takes proper care of its collections, sharing them with visitors and keeping them safe for future generations.

Durham Cathedral Museum is spread over three rooms, each with unique displays from the cathedral's historic collections. The story of the Benedictine monks is told in the Monks' Dormitory, which still boasts its magnificent original 15th century oak timber roof, temporary exhibitions which use items from the cathedral collections to tell community stories, are hosted in the Collections Gallery and in the octagonal Great Kitchen visitors can see St Cuthbert's Pectoral Cross and coffin.

To celebrate the award, cathedral staff held an accreditation party which also coincided with the launch of the museum's new exhibition Glorious Gospels!, which is in the Collections Gallery until 13th October 2024.

Earlier this year, the Museum also became the new home of the recently re-built Durham



Cathedral in LEGO® and plans are in place to make this area of the museum even more family-friendly by summer 2024 with a Monks' dressing up area and an artefact stenciling station.

Accreditation opens up exciting funding opportunities, allows museums to host touring exhibitions and gives access to professional advice and support. It also gives confidence to donors and sponsors who may wish to support the museum in preserving heritage and inspiring future generations so further potential developments could be possible.



Giant Prehistoric Monsters at Bishop Auckland



Visitors are invited to step back in time with two new exhibitions showing the giant prehistoric monsters that once roamed the UK and Europe. Carboniferous Monsters will be at Bishop Auckland Town Hall until Saturday 31st August.

Situated in the Durham County Council venue's main gallery, visitors can step back to the Carboniferous period, 100 million years before the dinosaurs, and visit tropical forests and swamps teeming with bizarre and ferocious ancient monsters - some of which had larger teeth than T-Rex.

Meet the dinosaurs' distant ancestors: the very first reptiles, the largest creepy-crawlies ever to live, and prehistoric animals unlike anything anyone has seen before. Come face-to-face with scorpions the size of dogs, millipedes the length of crocodiles, and giant meat-eating dragonflies the size of seagulls.

Continue to the venue's Strong Room Gallery to see Two Minutes to Midnight, an exhibition created by artist and Newcastle University fine art student Sarah March. It continues the prehistoric theme with eight giant canvas panels as reimagined cave paintings. each covering a period of time from the Carboniferous to now - the rise of man. County Durham's vast coalfields were created during the Carboniferous period by the compressed remains of animals and plants which existed at that time. If the history of the earth was a 24-hour clock, a full day, then dinosaurs only appeared at 11.30pm, half an hour before the end of the day, while humans only appeared at around two minutes before midnight.

The species depicted in Two Minutes to Midnight range from plants, invertebrates and vertebrates, on both the land and in the sea. All the species are chosen, as their fossils were found in the British Isles, Europe or worldwide. Carboniferous Monsters is a blockbuster national touring exhibition and features stunning 350-million-year-old original fossils, reconstructed giant prehistoric animals, and skeleton casts from museums around the world, many of which have never been displayed in the UK before.

Both exhibitions will be free to view from Monday to Saturday, 10am to 4pm. For more information, visit www.bishopaucklandtownhall. org.uk

The council has launched a consultation seeking views on how these services can be delivered in the future, with a focus on ensuring they continue to meet people's needs.

Cllr Alan Shield, the council's Cabinet member for equality and inclusion, said: "We work closely with our partner organisations such as Citizens Advice County Durham, Age UK, Durham Carers, East Durham Trust, Durham Foodbank, Community Money Advice and many others to provide our residents with free, confidential and impartial advice and support on a range of issues and topics.

"However, the advice and support needs of our residents and communities have changed in recent years. A good example is the increase in demand we're seeing from people who are in either full or part-time employment and who need financial advice related to the higher cost of living due to pressures such as the rise in mortgage and rent charges as well as fuel and food cost increases.

"We're always looking to make sure the services we commission and deliver meet those changing needs, so we are seeking people's views on their experiences of accessing the advice service sector across the whole of County Durham.

"We'd also like to hear about the types of advice and support people would like to see offered in future and how they'd like to access it, whether that be through face-to-face appointments, telephone lines, online help or through any other suitable methods.

"Ultimately, we want to commission and deliver the most effective services we can and make it easy for people to find and access the help they need. To do that, we need to better understand people's needs and experiences, so we would really welcome and appreciate local views."

Responses to the consultation will help the council shape its commissioning arrangements for advice services in the future.

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report





Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, came out on top in the battle of the bottom two, eventually winning by five wickets at home to Stockton 2nd XI in the NYSD second division. The visitors were asked to bat first and were blown away by some superb bowling by captain James Layfield-Carroll (sponsored by Yvonne and Bob Wood), who finished with seasonal best figures of 6 for 40 from his marathon unbroken 15 over spell. Luke Telford (2 for 6) and Ben Howard (2 for 18) also bowled well to help to dismiss Stockton for 111 from 38.4 overs. In reply, Aycliffe were wobbling on 33 for 4, despite an aggressive 19 off 12 balls by opener Luke Telford. An excellent 5th wicket partnership of 57 between Terence Smit (27 off 45 balls) and Adam Gittins (36 not out off 77 balls) put Aycliffe back on track. When Smit was dismissed, Ryan Patrick (8 not out off 15 balls) continued the good work with Gittins to help take Aycliffe safely over the winning line after 29 overs and with five wickets in hand.

The second team were given the full 25 points when their opponents Bedale 2nd XI were unable to field a team in their scheduled NYSD fourth division match.

The club's U17's lost by nine wickets against Hartlepool at home in the semi-final of the NYSD Junior Cup. Choosing to bat first, Aycliffe scored a respectable 122 for 6 in their allotted overs in an innings again dominated by captain Tom Dearden. The talented youngster top scored with 52 retired off just 37 balls and it was Dearden's 6th half century for the U17's team this season, which is a new club record. Ramzan Hussain (18 off 20 balls), Leo Stout (16 off 33 balls) and Liam Scott (13 off 17 balls) all made vital contributions to the score. In reply, the visitors eased to victory after 16.3 overs with 12 year old Freddie Lawler taking the only wicket to fall.

The U15's were heavily defeated by 107 runs away at Barnard Castle in the quarter finals of the NYACC League Cup. Chasing a formidable 202 for an unlikely victory, Aycliffe batted well and scored a respectable 94 all out in their 20 overs thanks to excellent innings from both Freddie Lawler (39 off 34 balls) and Trent Telford (30 off 26 balls). The U15's were beaten again when they returned to league action away at Darlington despite an excellent all round performance by captain Tom Norman, who took 2 for 24 with the ball and then opened the batting when Aycliffe replied and carried his bat scoring an unbeaten 10 off 45 balls. Fellow opener Liam Scott also batted well, hitting a four and a six before he was dismissed for 12 runs off 11 balls.
