St. Joseph's 2024 Leavers Super Season for Woodham Academy FC





Following confirmation that more prisoners will be subject to early release to ease prison overcrowding, PCC Joy Allen is calling for better resettlement packages to deter reoffending. The PCC is clear that without appropriate levels of support, both the prisoner and the justice system are being set up to fail.

"Far too many prisoners are being released on licence without any practical support," she explained. "I met a woman recently who explained that she was released from prison without anywhere to live. This meant that she breached her licence conditions and was returned to prison very quickly.

"This then adds to the overcrowding conundrum, and we are in a worse position than before. It's like bed blocking in the secure estate. We have to get the basics right. If prisoners are to be released early, then everything possible should be done to keep them out of prison, not returning within a few days. That makes a mockery of the whole early release system.

"I know that this will heap pressure on other agencies, but we have to be practical. We cannot condone prisoners being released early, without a home or means by which to live. That simply leads to further problems. I know we are told that there will be 1000 more probation officers by March 2025, which is good news for the future, but something needs doing now! The whole process needs fixing, not just capacity inside the prisons.

"I will be writing to the Minister for Justice and the Home Secretary to explain my concerns, and asking for assurance that the lack of resettlement support will not simply lead to further overcrowding."

Green Flag Awards

Two crematoriums in County Durham have retained their Green Flag status for another year.

Mountsett Crematorium and Durham Crematorium have each been given a Green Flag, an international award which acknowledges parks and green spaces for their good quality, excellent facilities, and high standards of maintenance.

Both sites are maintained by Durham County Council, with Durham Crematorium run in partnership with Spennymoor Town Council and Mountsett Crematorium in conjunction with Gateshead Council.

Graham Harrison, Durham County Council's bereavement services manager, said: "We are pleased that our crematoriums have once again been awarded a Green Flag. The accolade acknowledges the hard work put in by staff to keep grounds in the best condition for everyone who visits.

"Our crematoriums are a place for very personal ceremonies and memorials, so it is important to us that these grounds are maintained to a high standard so that they are a calming and pleasant environment for visitors."

The Green Flag Award scheme, managed by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy under licence from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government, recognises and rewards well-managed parks and green spaces.

Any green space that is freely accessible to the public is eligible to apply for a Green Flag Award.

Awards are given on an annual basis and winners must apply each year to renew their Green Flag status.





A debt of gratitude to everyone who came to see myself, June and Valerie at the petting zoo last Saturday and not forgetting Joyce, it was a very cold day too, I can't thank Keith and Rebecca Lovejoy for making this the best event ever, the support I received has put me in a strong position to keep feeding and caring for all the very small hogs I have here, all 14 of them, and the bigger ones too. I currently have 24 here. The hoglets aren't only messy but they are expensive too, they walk through all their food, but they are super cute nevertheless and they are all doing well here. Thanks to Joan for her donation too, much appreciated. It's been a tough road caring for these little ones, I have been fundraising and also up during the night to keep these hoglets from getting hungry, I work alone caring for them and medicating too, whenever necessary, and some babies have had to be put on antibiotics. My day starts at 5.45 with the clean up to start their day. Four hourly feeds, then up at 2am for feeds to keep them alive and well. Yes I am still tired, but I would rather be tired and have them here safe from harm. I get to witness them growing up which is very rewarding. The three little babies from Hopper Road are

doing ok, they are siblings so they will remain together for as long as they are here. I have also got three little ones here that were born here. Goldie their mum can be released now, it's no fun being in rescue at over 1000 grams, my thanks go to Steve and Lesley for taking her in and support feeding her in their garden she was grabbed by a dog in Darlington whilst she was out during the day looking for food, her baby girls are named Itsy, Bitsy and Teeny. Bet Lynda, Jackie and John Connell like those names!

I can't stress enough the urgency needed to help these poor downtrodden mammals, if you see a hog out during the day please act, pick them up and put them in a high sided box, then seek help. All too often, small hogs get attacked by corvids, flies etc, heartbreaking and avoidable to say the least. They all have too much to deal with out there, it's so unfair. Pictured is my smallest baby, this is Baby Button, he weighs only 76 grams, but is healthy, the food I purchase is very good, but expensive, they all enjoy their Royal Canin mousse and kibble.

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report



Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, lost by six wickets away at league leaders Barnard Castle 2nd XI in the NYSD second division. Aycliffe were asked to bat first in tricky conditions and were bowled out for a below par 161 after 28.4 overs. Captain James Layfield-Carroll (sponsored by Yvonne and Bob Wood) top scored with 38 off 39 balls and other useful contributions came from Joe Teasdale (35 off 23 balls) and Chris Palmer (25 off 29 balls). In reply, the homeside eased to victory after 29.4 overs and with six wickets in hand despite a couple of wickets from leg spin bowler Tom Dearden. The second team had to contend with a few stoppages for rain and the subsequent loss of vital overs, but in the end could only manage a draw at home to Skelton Castle 1st XI in the NYSD fourth division. Electing to bat first, Aycliffe piled up an imposing 208 for 6 declared after 33.3 overs thanks to a brilliant century from 18 year old Ramzan Hussain (sponsored by Athena Sports Academy). The talented youngster was finally dismissed for a career best 114 off just 66 balls and his memorable innings contained 18 boundaries and four huge sixes. Opener Matty French also deserves credit for scoring a solid 29 off 80 balls and sharing a 3rd wicket partnership of 96 with the centurion Hussain. In reply, Aycliffe were allotted 32 overs, rather than the usual

40 overs, to try to dismiss the visitors, as a vital eight overs were lost due to the rain interruptions. However, Aycliffe still worked hard in the difficult conditions and had Skelton Castle at 141 for 7 when the overs ran out. Leon Patel was the pick of the bowlers taking 3 for 25 and Matty Greaves also bowled well taking 2 for 12, but the 8 overs that were lost proved crucial as the visiting batsmen dug in for a draw with three wickets in hand. The club's U17's finished top of their group after a brilliant win by 35 runs at home to Barnard Castle in the NYSD 100 Cup. Aycliffe won the toss and chose to bat first and were indebted to a fantastic 2nd wicket partnership of 114 between captain Tom Dearden and Ramzan Hussain. Dearden continued his extraordinary run of form to top score with 82, which was his 7th half century in nine junior games and his dominant innings contained ten boundaries and five sixes off just 39 balls. Hussain also impressed, scoring 47 off 37 balls, smashing four boundaries and four sixes as Aycliffe finished on a very challenging 150 for 9 from their 100 balls. In reply, the visitors were restricted to 115 for 5 from their 100 balls thanks to some tight bowling from Tom Dearden (2 for 16), Dan Heaton (2 for 28) and Freddie Lawler (1 for 17). Special mention must also go to 13 year old stand in wicket keeper Trent Telford who claimed two stumpings and a catch and 12 year old Archie Brown who made his debut and fielded superbly for the team. The girls U11s team played their first festival of the season at Bedale Cricket Club and came away with two wins and a defeat. The girls beat Thirsk in one of their three games by 26 runs, thanks to some good batting by captain Carys Myers (11 not out off 4 balls) and Evie Dean (10 not out off 3 balls) and tight bowling by Neve Britton who took the only wicket to fall when Thirsk batted.

Hopetown Darlington Opens Its Doors

The north's newest visitor attraction has announced its opening date - and tickets are now available to book. In 1825, a railway journey changed the world forever. Locomotion No. 1 became the first steam locomotive to haul a passenger-carrying train on a public railway - the Stockton and Darlington Railway.

It's Darlington that will be the destination for tens of thousands of visitors this summer when the region's newest visitor attraction, Hopetown Darlington, throws open its doors - just in time for the school holidays. Following a £35m investment, Hopetown Darlington opened to the public on Tuesday 16th July. Visitors to Hopetown Darlington will enter through the restored Goods Shed on McNay Street. Originally constructed in 1833, and believed to be the second-oldest goods shed remaining in the country, this Grade II listed building now houses a café, shop, and digital media experience. Another Grade II listed building, North Road Station Museum (formerly the Head of Steam), celebrates the past, present and future of rail travel and engineering brilliance with a £3 million investment into a brand new interactive permanent exhibition.

In the Carriage Works, the opening special exhibition is Brick Journeys, a tour through the world of transport made entirely from Lego® bricks. Also within this Grade II listed building is The Stores, where people of all ages can explore Hopetown's archive and discover artefacts and objects not on permanent display.

At Darlington Locomotive Works - the new purpose-built home of the A1 Steam Locomotive Trust - Hopetown visitors can watch members and volunteers of the Trust build the UK's newest steam engine.

Hopetown Darlington celebrates the innovation and experimentation that put Darlington on the map - and that all starts with play. Children's imaginations can run free in Wagon Woods, the attraction's railway-themed immersive outdoor adventure play park based on a Georgian feat of engineering - the Stockton & Darlington Railway's Brusselton Incline. Developed in consultation with local primary schools, the play park includes an accessible incline track with interactive features and a companion slide suitable for wheelchair users.

Those who come by car will be able to park in style in a new car park overlooked by none other than the Grade 1 listed Skerne Bridge - which holds the distinction of being



the oldest railway bridge in the world still in continuous use. Skerne Bridge Car Park will accommodate more than 200 vehicles, including spaces for disabled parking and electric charging points. A 20-minute walk from the town centre, Hopetown Darlington benefits from frequent bus services and shares a site with North Road railway station. The station is served hourly, in each direction, by Northern Trains on the Saltburn to Bishop Auckland railway line. From here you can connect to the main Darlington Railway Station (Bank Top) which benefits from mainline connections to the rest of Britain.

Entry to the site will be free of charge. Free site admission will include entry to North Road Station Museum, Darlington Locomotive Works viewing gallery and The Stores, as well as the shop, café and outdoor areas. A free ticket will be required to enter the site. Visitors are advised to pre-book their free ticket. This will reduce queue times and allow visitors to plan their day with certainty - including selecting their arrival time - to avoid disappointment at busy times.

Some exhibitions, events and activities carry a separate charge. For these, a separate ticket will be required, in addition to a free site admission ticket. These include Wagon Woods adventure play park and the Brick Journeys exhibition in the Carriage Works. Pre-booking is recommended to avoid disappointment. There was also free entertainment in the form of the Streets of Brass performances across Durham City, Party in the Park at the city's Wharton Park, and Big and Little Brass Bashes at ten towns and villages across the county. The festival's final scenes saw a DJ set from Smoove & Turrell at Durham Town Hall, and Loud Noises performing at Durham Miners' Gala.

Brass also prides itself on its outreach programme, with 65 performances across the week in schools across County Durham and a number in care homes.

Norman Cornish and **LS Lowry Exhibition**

Newly discovered Cornish self-portrait will also now feature in this major exhibition by two extraordinary storytellers of everyday life, who showcase the north through different lenses. Over 50 paintings, drawings and sketches by artists Norman Cornish and LS Lowry will be showcased at The Bowes Museum from 20th July 2024 to 19th January 2025. This major new exhibition includes 35 rarely or previously unseen



artworks by the artists who shared a strong love of the north, which was the focus of so much of their work, and who have a history of exhibiting together.

The exhibition will also now feature a newly discovered self-portrait by Norman Cornish. This new painting was uncovered during conservation work to Cornish's painting Bar Scene. The Bowes Museum's Conservator, Jon Old, described its discovery as 'magical'. Although it shows Cornish in his younger days, it is not yet known where this never-before-seen painting fits in the wider chronology of the artist's works, but it has now become the 29th known self-portrait by Cornish and will be proudly displayed facing the other self-portraits in the exhibition.

The exhibition takes visitors on a journey from 'meeting' both artists to seeing their perceptions of the different environments they encountered. These, and the experiences shared by their friends, family and the wider community within those places, are beautifully documented throughout. The artworks span different themes, from community and working life to the role of women.

Visitors can also see a different style from Lowry with more figurative sketches and paintings of his loved ones. These include portraits of his mother and father, and Study of a Girl in Peasant Dress 1917, which are quite unlike his more familiar matchstick style figures.

From August to November the Museum will also host an engaging series

of talks supporting the exhibition. The five talks include intimate reflections and personal stories from members of the Cornish family, and insights into LS Lowry's life and works by Curator of The Lowry Collection in Salford Claire Stewart. Attendees can also hear Redhill's CEO Nick Malyan explore the area's mining history and what this community looks like today, and Dr Vicki Pugh, from York St John University, who will discuss the relationship between industry and the environment.
