

Thousands Enrolled for Free School Meals

Nearly 2000 families in County Durham will save hundreds of pounds a year thanks to a pilot free school meals scheme.

Durham County Council ran a pilot project which saw nearly 2500 children automatically enrolled for free school meals following a data matching exercise on their family's eligibility.

This means that 1727 households eligible for free school meals were

automatically signed up to the scheme, saving the families an average of £400 per child per year on food costs.

Schools in County Durham will also benefit from this initiative through eligibility for the government's pupil premium grant, where they will receive extra funding for every child that is registered for free school meals.

The council's auto enrolment project has meant schools across the county will be getting an additional £3 million of funding next year which can be used towards extra support in the classroom.

September has been a very busy month as your local Member of Parliament. Myself and my new office team have now responded to over 1500 emails and helped 500 people with individual pieces of casework including very complex issues around housing, welfare and education. I've also secured a big win for the Newton Aycliffe, following a lot of painstaking work.

Success in saving the Aycliffe semi-conductor plant

Since before the election, I've been working hard behind the scenes to help secure a clear future for what was the Coherent semi-conductor factory in Aycliffe Business Park. Newtonians, my age and older, will remember HM Queen Elizabeth opening the factory as a Fujitsu plant in 1991.

After a contract to make electric chips for Apple iPhones was moved abroad earlier this year, the high-tech facility was facing sale and possible closure. The factory also makes semi-conductor technology for UK defence, including fighter jets, so it was clear there was a strong local and national argument for investing in this plant and saving the 100 jobs. I've been working with Labour's defence team to push this for some months.

After months of confidential work, I was delighted to welcome Defence Secretary, John Healey MP, to Newton Aycliffe to announce the government would step in to save the plant. In a £20 million takeover, the Ministry of Defence bought the facility to secure homegrown supply of this vital defence equipment. As well as saving local jobs, the new government is committed to investing in future growth and opportunities at the Newton Aycliffe plant. This important announcement shows the value of having a pro-active, local MP who's standing up for our town. New staff team recruited

I'm really pleased to say that, after interviewing in the last few weeks, my staff team is now at full strength. I've had to recruit from scratch, as a new MP, and have been pleased to hire some excellent local residents from across our constituency.

Like most Members of Parliament, my staff team are split between an office here in the constituency and in Westminster. Standing up for our area is my top priority, so I've spent the majority of my staffing budget locally. My constituency team assist with enquiries, help me to chase government departments and other organisations, who residents are having problems with, and book in local meetings. I've now got an Office Manager, Senior Caseworker, Caseworker and part-time Communications Officer. We're currently working from temporary office space and are moving to premises in Newton Aycliffe in the near future. The other part of my job is making sure we have a strong voice in Parliament and being a national legislator. That involves meeting government ministers to raise issues, asking questions, speaking in the House of Commons and engaging with organisations to push local issues. It also involves scrutinising and voting on laws. To help me with my work in Parliament, I've recruited a Parliamentary Researcher, who starts shortly

County Consider Food Waste Collections

The region's largest council will consider preparations to begin collecting food waste.

Durham County Council's Cabinet will be asked to approve changes to County Durham's household recycling collections in line with the Simpler Recycling reforms introduced by Government.

The new legislation makes it a statutory requirement for councils to collect the same materials for recycling across the country, making it easier for residents to know what can and cannot be recycled. This includes a requirement for all councils to introduce weekly

household food waste collections by 31st March 2026, and by March 2025 for large businesses.

Cabinet will hear that options have been considered for collecting food waste and that weekly collections in a separate specialised vehicle called a stillage vehicle - would be the most cost effective and efficient

The stillage vehicles have small compartments, which would also make it possible to safely collect small batteries and used vapes from households

The council is also proposing to simplify recycling, making it easier for residents and for refuse collectors. Glass recycling is proposed to be collected in the main recycling blue-lidded bin, rather than in a separate

As the new legislation requires food waste collections for large businesses to be in place by March 2025, Cabinet will be asked to approve the procurement of a small number of waste collection vehicles.

Residents will be contacted about their collection date and provided with containers ahead of household food waste collections coming into place in 2026.

Labour is Failing Pensioners and **Tax Payers**

Further to Vince Crosby's letter in the Newton News (27th September), I'm loathe to cross swords again, but feel that I must.

Labour appears to have forgotten its preelection promise of being a 'party for people,

Only five months ago, the then Shadow Work and Pensions Minister, Alison McGovern, told the Guardian that Labour would be 'the party for pensioners'

Apparently not. How many pensioners were conned into voting Labour, only to be stitched up, within days, with the abolition of winter fuel payments?

And, despite a £10 billion windfall from the Bank of England, Labour MPs - including our own - still voted to cut this much needed

Weren't we told that Labour's plans had been fully costed? And, didn't they promise that any holes in the finances would be borne by the 'broadest shoulders'?

Let's look at some figures.

There may well be some very well-off pensioners - particularly those on gold-plated public service pensions, which cost around £5 trillion a year.

But, according to a report in The Telegraph on September 17th, the pension increase of 6.8% for public sector pensions this year is going to cost current tax payers a whopping £208 billion - because that's the shortfall needed to fund the rise.

So, yes, some pensioners are able to live the high life, but tell that to the single pensioner on a state pension, struggling to pay their bills. And, if you are just a couple of quid over the threshold, you will not qualify for Pension Credit (which attracts other benefits, like TV licences and free dental/optical care).

Instead of robbing pensioners, what is the government doing to tackle fraud - especially benefit fraud?

According to the latest Fraud Indicator Report, annual UK benefit fraud losses could be as much as £219 billion! How many doctors, nurses and police could that pay for? If the government recouped just half of that, it would pay almost all of the UK's State Pension bill for the year.

Having worked all my life to get my State Pension (incidentally, one of the lowest in Europe), I resent the myth that all pensioners are rich. But means testing people who have worked all of their lives is just insulting. Vince Crosby's 'I'm alright Jack' attitude is unbecoming. Yes, he may 'cope' with the lost heating allowance, but a million pensioners,

who are in poverty, won't.

Meanwhile, two tier Kier - on his annual salary of around £170,000 - won't have to worry about his outgoings. He's already had thousands of pounds in donations from his mate, Lord Alli. Not a good look is it? Debbie Ingram.
