### William Cooksey is a Guinness World Record Holder

The late William Cooksey completed some amazing feats during his lifetime, none more impressive than entering and completing the Great North Run 2023 at the age of 102 years old.

After finished this incredible task, Newton News contacted the Guinness World Records to enquire if this was indeed a new world record. After completing the usual paperwork, clarifying and confirming all the details, this honour was bestowed on Mr Cooksey as Newton News received a certificate from the Guinness World Records organisation:

"We are thrilled to inform you that your application for 'Oldest Person to Complete a Half Marathon (Male)' has been successful and you are now the Guinness World Records Title Holder."

Debbie Iceton said "William passed away before being awarded with this honour, which will be very hard for anyone to beat but it means Bill's name will be in the Guinness Book of World Records for many, many years to come."

"At the age of 100 Bill walked 100 miles, at the age of 101 he cycled 1000 miles, all in aid of the County Durham NHS Trust Foundation."

### Little Trooper Awarded Military Children's Medal

Eleven-year-old Indy from Newton Aycliffe has been awarded a medal by the children's charity, Little Troopers, for being brave following a health scare while her Dad was serving away from home with the British Army.

Indy Johnston has been rushed to hospital three times this year due to severe sickness and dehydration. Unsure what was causing Indy to be so poorly, she underwent several blood tests and scans before being diagnosed with swollen lymph nodes and a congenital kidney condition that was causing Cyclical Vomiting Syndrome. On her latest hospital stay, Indy's Dad, who serves with the British Army in the REME, was



serving away from home on a military exercise and unable to be by her bedside.

Indy is now fully recovered and has not been poorly since the summer. Her Mum, Vicky, nominated her for the 'Little Trooper of the Month' award after showing remarkable resilience and bravery.

Vicky comments: "Indy has always been so resilient. Along with her three siblings, she's grown up as a military child and moved home eight times in eleven years to various different Army postings across the UK, but she has always taken everything in her stride and seen life as an adventure. The last few months have been incredibly tough for her, especially because her Dad was away while we were in and out of hospital trying to get a diagnosis, but her courage and ability to stay positive in the face of adversity is truly inspiring."

Indy will receive a medal and £100 gift voucher from Little Troopers. Speaking of her award win, Indy says: "I am amazed I've won the Little Troopers Award and I will use my prize to treat my brothers and sisters to a day out at the cinema."

Louise Fetigan, founder of Little Troopers, adds: "Growing up as a forces child can come with plenty of challenges on its own - as Indy has experienced, moving home eight times in eleven years. But to then face health worries on top of this and be in and out of hospital at a time when your serving parent is away, is really tough. Our Little Trooper of the Month Award scheme is all about recognising military children who've faced adversity and deserve to be recognised. We hope Indy wears her medal with pride."

Little Troopers is a registered charity supporting children who have parents serving in the British Armed Forces. Through its resources and initiatives, the charity connects with thousands of military children each year, as well as running special projects such as the Little Troopers All Together deployment club and Little Troopers at School programme. The Little Trooper of the Month award scheme is sponsored by technology group, Thales.

#### The County Council of Durham (Wynyard Court, Newton Aycliffe) (Temporary Road Closure) Order 2024

The Council on 15/11/2024 made the above Order under Section 14(1) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 as amended, to prohibit all vehicular traffic from pro-ceeding on the following lengths of road. A 58 metre length of Wynyard Court, Newton Aycliffe, to the front of numbers 5 to 6 and numbers 1 to 4 Wynyard Court, to enable sewer repair works to be undertaken. Throughout the period of the closure, no alternative diversion will be available to vehicular traffic. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commen from 8am on Monday 25/11/2024 and are anticipated to be completed in 5 day On occasions, alternative dates for the closure may be necessary and these will signed accordingly.

### **N.A.F.C. REPORT**

Stocksbridge Park Steels 1 v Newton Aycliffe 1

#### Newton Aycliffe recorded a 1-1 draw against

Stocksbridge Park Steels on Saturday. It was a frustrating, niggly game which wasn't really one for the neutral. Whilst a point away from home would otherwise be a good result, a feeling of 'what if' will pervade in the Aycliffe

camp due to several missed late game chances. The first twenty minutes or so featured Stocksbridge trying to fire high crosses into the Aycliffe box, but Jim Pollard consistently dealt with them. The home side would keep Aycliffe to their own half for the majority of the first thirty minutes. Stocksbridge would eventually open the scoring when Joao Silva used his pace to pickpocket the Aycliffe defence and get past Pollard to score into an empty net.

Despite the first half not having too many chances for either side, Aycliffe would score with arguably their best one, Liam Jarvie used his skills to get into the Stocksbridge box and, while his initial shot was saved by Ben Towsend, Dean Thexton successfully got on the follow up to make it 1-1. The rest of the first half was similar to how it started, with two teams struggling to pass on a heavy pitch, thus making both teams resort to frequent crosses and headers.

The second half saw a chance for Aycliffe within the opening minutes when a free kick resulted in a wide header from Jake Petitjean. Shortly after, Petitjean would fire a shot from out the box that was easily saved by Townsend. He had a similar shot in the 74th minute which Townsend once again saved.

Stocksbridge substitute James Morrison had a golden opportunity to change the game in the 86th minute, but his shot in the Aycliffe box flew well wide, summing up a game where two sides struggled to muster any noteworthy chances. In the 90th minute, and beyond, all the possession was Aycliffe, in a game where Stocksbridge had held the majority. Had this attacking spell came earlier, the games complexion might have changed with two missed Aycliffe chances late in the game, summing up a frustrating afternoon, as the score remained 1-1. Aycliffe have a midweek trip to Bridlington before returning to Moore Lane on Saturday 23rd November when Garforth Town will be the visitors. That game will be followed by a Race Night in the Sports Club at 6.00pm. Entry is free, so please stay on after the game.

### Strong & Resilient Communities

Plans to create twelve Local Networks across County Durham will be discussed as Durham County Council is proposing to replace its current fourteen Area Action Partnerships (AAPs) with the twelve Local Networks from April 2025.

The aim of the new model is to enhance the capacity of local communities and individuals to become involved in improving their area. Local Networks will adopt a more strategic and outcomes-focussed approach, developing four-year local action plans to guide investment and identify more opportunities for partnership working.

Alongside this, the existing AAP Forum, made up of 15,000 people, will form a new county wide County Durham Community Network with increased opportunities to engage and help shape local network plans.

The decision to replace the fourteen AAPs with twelve Local Networks reflects the updated electoral divisions and ensures that county councillors will only cover one Local Network area, creating more consistent population sizes and ensuring a more equitable allocation of budgets.

It is expected that the new Local Networks will take over from the AAPs on 1st April 2025. This will allow time to prepare for the council elections in May 2025 and ensure the fouryear Local Network plans are aligned to the electoral cycle. The council's Cabinet is recommended to agree the new Local Network boundaries and agree the proposed time scales for implementing the Local Networks when it meets. # **Year in Athletics**



Laurie Cummings has had another remarkable year in athletics at the tender young age of 83. To summarise, he has finished first Veteran Over 80 in every race that he has competed in, beating over 10,000 athletes. After winning all North East Masters AA League meetings he raced 100m, 200m, 300m, 400m, 1500m, 1 mile and 3000m as well as winning gold in the 5000m AA Masters Championships and gold in the British Masters 10,000m Championship at Jarrow. After winning the 5km road race at Croft Circuit in 25.47, Laurie was first V80 at the Darlington 10km road race in 56.14, before winning the Quayside 5km at Newcastle three days later in 27.05. The 10,000m this year was on the track,

finishing in a time of 55.53, was the 8th best of all time for a UK athlete.

Laurie is ranked fourth in the all time list of mile racers. In the track he is ranked, as a V80, second in the mile, third in the 3000m, 4th in 5000m and 1st in the 10.000m and on the road, second over a mile. In addition to these, he now holds 153 age category records at parkruns around the UK.

At the recent Darlington Borough Council Stronger Communities Awards, which was held at the Dolphin Centre on Fridav 8th November, Laurie was the nominated winner out of three nominees for 'Performance in Sport' category, for which he received a trophy and certificate.

## Another Successful School Parking Issues

Dear friends, neighbours and residents,

Firstly, congratulations to Woodham Academy on the opening of the new school. I also hope you enjoyed the fireworks at the OakLeaf. There are also some nice Christmas decorations and lights beginning to brighten our ward.

Secondly, Central Avenue has been a lot quieter with the road closure but has caused some long detours. Thank you everyone for your patience. However, despite the reduction in traffic, school runs remain busy with no drop off point due to Durham Council trying to encourage teenagers to walk and cycle to 'big school'.

Most parents are allowing 12+ years to walk and only 20-30 car driving parents believe Tesco, Moore Lane and St Oswald's is too far for their older students.

A real problem is that up to six local residents insist on parking dangerously close to the entrance of Washington Crescent and Morrisons shop, causing blockages, near the Central Avenue entrance and next to Morrisons shop. Greater Manchester Police and Wigan Council have highlighted the Highway Code saying 10 metres is the only safe distance to park near a iunction.

I am going to ask the Durham Police Commissioner, Joy Allen, and neighbourhood Wardens, if we can have similar leaflets for Newton Avcliffe.

We all know that Aycliffe has a shortage of parking bays due to many houses now having 2-3 cars. However, cars are parking purposely near junctions, when there are many empty spaces in Morrisons car parking bays and Felton Close.

This just to save walking 10 metres or less. Excuses range from: 'I can't cross the road because I am a single parent' or 'I can't use the layby because I have CCTV' and 'I want to park in front of my house'. Thess individuals needs, v the whole community, means that three or four residents are happy, but dozens of residents and shop/school visitors have to queue up constantly, to get around two or three cars blocking the road. I ask those minority of people to consider the police and Highway Code safety warnings and respect the needs of the whole community. The younger children, elderly and disabled, need protecting when having to cross the road and cars not in bays block their visibility.

Please park safely without causing an obstruction. Thank you.

It's been a busy couple of weeks as your Member of Parliament, standing up for our area in Parliament and supporting some of our fantastic community organisations.

Pushing to secure a positive future for the Hitachi factory in Aycliffe remains a top priority. I brought Jim Brewin, the UK Chief Director of Hitachi, to Parliament to meet a group of North East MPs, to update us on the negotiations to secure new orders. This is crucial to fill the gap they have between current train orders and future High Speed Rail contracts to come. We were pleased to hear that there's been a step change in the speed and quality of negotiations since the new government was elected and good progress is being made. As part of my work on Hitachi, I also met Lord Hendy, the Rail Minister. I spoke to Lord Hendy about the situation at Hitachi, which he was fully on top of. We also discussed the need to end the 'feast or famine' approach to rail manufacturing which we saw under the Conservative government. This is part of what caused Hitachi's problems and we must move to a more sensible, planned approach to placing train orders and away from the chaotic manner we've seen previously. I also met with representatives of LNER and Northern Rail to discuss how to

improve rail connectivity in the new constituency. Back in the constituency, I had the pleasure of meeting with the inspirational local charity, Sisters of Support. They're based in Aycliffe, but provide a peer support group for women across the County, supporting female survivors of domestic abuse and those struggling with their mental health. Having only set the charity up three years ago, they have grown and expanded and are doing brilliant work. Noticing the lack of support for women, they look to provide a bridge between those struggling and the support networks they are entitled to.

They have run successful local campaigns such as #WeAreListening which encouraged women to come forward and share their experiences, breaking down the barriers and stigma around mental health. Please have a look at their website or their Facebook page if you think they might be able to help you.

It's encouraging to see vital work like this in our community and I'm delighted that the government is taking mental health seriously. The Health Secretary has set out plans to give mental health the same level of focus as physical health. Extra funding for our NHS was announced in this recent Budget. This will go a long way to tackling the mental health crisis and supporting fantastic local charities like this one. I also attended the Cornforth Partnership in West Cornforth for my MP advice surgery. Beforehand I got to see the brilliant work they are also doing to support local people across our area, including employment training, benefits advice and community activities. They do great work in their community, helping to get people back into work and access to services that they need. I acknowledged their hard work in my maiden speech as an MP and I look forward to supporting them throughout my term.

Finally, I was honoured to unveil the newly refurbished St Catherine's Church Hall in Fishburn. I've been to lots of events there and seen firsthand the real sense of community. Facilities like this are the heartbeat of our local communities and improvements like this will allow this to be a hub for residents for years to come.

My constituency office continues to work through the emails and queries they receive from constituents every day. Thank you to everyone that has been in touch recently. My team and I are working hard to support a large number of residents, including families facing very serious issues. 



### SCAM ALERT: Watch Out for Fake Dentist

People are being urged to be aware of social media posts claiming a new dentist is opening with NHS places in Shildon.

Durham County Council's trading standards team is warning people to be on their guard after receiving five complaints about the supposed new venture in premises which once housed a genuine dental practice. Posts show a new waiting room and even comment on new modern additions complimenting the building's 1800s heritage. The posts state there is some urgency in what they are offering and that the offer is a limited time one, asking people to contact them quickly and only within a short window of time. An option to call the surgery is given with the usual fallback of an internet registration option. This is where the scammers want people to go, as they can ask for what would seem like normal details: personal information and payment details.

Anyone who has been a victim of the post is advised to contact their bank or building society to make them aware of the scam. They can freeze or cancel bank cards and seek to recover what money they can but, more importantly, stop any further payments being taken, whilst also issuing a new card. Council officers carried out various checks, as soon as they became aware of the scam, including visiting the address given and finding it empty.

They also checked with the General Dental Practice and NHS. A website claiming to be that of the new dentist has been taken down. Ian Harrison, the council's business compliance manager, said: "We are aware that scams such as this are happening across the country.

"The scammers will have been aware of reports of people being unable to find NHS dentists and there being a shortage of appointments and will have seen this as an opportunity to exploit people and part them from their money.

"Not just this time of year, but all year-round, scammers will try to prey on members of the public in order to try to get their hard-earned money.

"Scams come in many shapes and forms, but usually follow similar formats. They often centre around a popular subject, product or service and create a time pressure to make people think they have to act quickly. "We would ask that people think very carefully before disclosing private information or banking details to any company, or organisation, that they are not familiar with." ### Magna Carta on Display at Durham Cathedral

Three rare Magna Cartas will go on display next summer at Durham Cathedral to celebrate the 800th anniversary of the 1225 issue in the cathedral's collection. Next summer, Durham Cathedral will be displaying its three rare Magna Cartas for the first time in eight years



for the 800th anniversary of the 1225 issue in our collection. From 11th July to 2nd November 2025, visitors will be able to see the rare documents as part of a new exhibition, Magna Carta and the North. On display will be the only surviving 1216 Magna Carta, along with issues from 1225 and 1300, and three Forest Charters - practical documents granting access to land and natural resources.

Magna Carta, or the 'Great Charter', has been described as the most famous document in English history and a cornerstone of modern democracy. First issued in 1215, it was the first document that put into writing that the king and his government were not above the law, in order to prevent the king from exploiting his power. With three clauses from the 1225 Magna Carta still in force today, the document remains a cornerstone of British democracy.

The last time the Magna Cartas and the Forest Charters were on display at Durham Cathedral was in the summer of 2017 when almost 19,000 people came to see them over an 11-week period. To celebrate the anniversary and the display of these rare surviving documents, the cathedral is also planning to host temporary installations and community-focused artworks throughout the cathedral that will tell the story of these 800-yearold documents that are still a powerful symbol of social justice in the world today.

Andrew Usher, Chief Officer for Visitor Experience and Enterprise says, "Next summer it will have been 8 years since the Magna Cartas and Forest Charters were last on display, so with the 800th anniversary of the 1225 issue we're keen to really mark the occasion, by not only showcasing these fascinating documents but also exploring what they mean in the world today. Taking inspiration from the themes of freedom and social justice we're looking at ways to engage even more people by telling the story of the Magna Cartas through art, light and sound around the cathedral."

From 11th July to 2nd November, visitors will be able to get up close to the documents in the Durham Cathedral Museum. Tickets will go on sale early next year and will cost £7.50 for adults and will be free for under 18s.
