# **Investment in Youth Crime Prevention**

A major new programme is underway to boost opportunities for young people at risk of being drawn into crime and anti-social behaviour thanks to a sixfigure investment by Police and Crime Commissioner Joy Allen.

The County Durham and Darlington PCC has provided a grant worth £118,010 to Future Pathways, an alternative provision provider working with young people who are disengaged from their communities, to deliver services for vulnerable young people living in the Darlington and Ferryhill areas

The announcement comes as the UK marks ASB Awareness Week - a national campaign organised by Resolve, the UK's leading ASB and community safety organisation, aimed at encouraging communities to take a stand against ASB and highlighting the actions that can be taken by those experiencing it. The new scheme will involve young people aged 10 to 16 in a range of positive activities including football, walking, boxing, bowling and biking to improve their mental health and wellbeing.

Three sessions will be hosted weekly in 10week blocks to help young people develop vital life skills to improve their employment prospects and divert them from crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB). Activities will take place between 5pm and 8pm to reflect the peak hours of ASB in the areas. Workshops are also being delivered as part of the programme to address risk-taking behaviours, focusing on issues such as knife crime, gang involvement, child sexual exploitation, addiction and dependency, sex, relationships and consent, serious violence, county lines and mental health and wellbeing.

Participants will be given the opportunity to become ambassadors of ASB prevention with the opportunity to work with professional bodies to discourage other young people from becoming involved in nuisance behaviour.

As part of a holistic approach, the initiative places a strong focus on family intervention and interaction. This means weekly contact will be maintained between youth workers and the families of those participating to update them on the activities being completed. Families will also receive a fiveweekly phone call through the programme to identify any additional needs or support for those young people with particularly challenging behaviour.

At the conclusion of the 10-week block, young people will be invited to showcase the positive activities they have taken part in and will be presented with certificates marking their achievements to help raise their aspirations.

Future Pathways will contribute matched funding worth just over £200k to the project. The PCC's grant will also provide school holiday provision delivering five hours of daytime support to young people accessing the ASB programme.

ASB typically spikes during the school holidays, putting additional strain on police and civil enforcement resources. Additionally, many families are without the financial means to provide activity for young people in the holidays, resulting in more young people spending more time within the community. The new provision will include high-intensity activities such as water sports, e-biking and army bootcamps.

# Permanent Christmas Tree for Aycliffe Village

Rather than purchasing a cut Christmas tree for Aycliffe Village green every year, the Council have taken the decision to purchase a Norway Spruce Fir which has now been planted on the green in a similar place to where the cut tree was erected in previous years. Planting a tree is much more sustainable to the environment and will be trained each year to produce a perfect shaped tree. It would have been unlikely that a larger tree would survive, so the tree is currently approximately 5 to 6 feet tall, once the roots establish, it is hoped that it will soon develop and provide a pleasant tree for many years to come.



The main Christmas tree provided by

the Town Council on Central Avenue, outside St. Clare's Church, will remain a cut tree of a similar size to previous years. It will be erected in late November along with the Christmas lights along Central Avenue, St Cuthberts Way and into Stephenson Way.

# **New Lung Cancer Screening Programme**



Local residents in Bishop Auckland will be the first to be invited to take part in County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust's new Lung Cancer Screening programme.

The scheme will see current and former smokers, aged 55-74, being invited for a telephone appointment where dedicated lung nurses will talk through potential symptoms, with a follow-up invite to undergo a low dose CT scan, where appropriate.

Bishop Auckland Hospital has recently been fitted with a brand new CT scanner to support the screening programme, with the Trust also having access to a mobile scanner.

Catherine Lamb, Lead Nurse, said "Lung cancer currently causes more deaths than any other cancer in the UK. However, it is curable if caught early.

"There are often no symptoms at the earlier stages of lung cancer, and it is regularly diagnosed late. Spotting problems early can make a big difference, and could save your life.

Lung Cancer Screening is aimed at achieving earlier detection of lung cancer, in areas where the population has a higher mortality from this type of cancer.

Katie Merrie, Service Lead, said: "Rates of lung cancer are high in County Durham - higher than many other parts of England. This is a much needed screening programme for our region. Telephone appointments are convenient for most people. Our CT scanners will be in community hospital locations, which are closer to home for our patients. We're dedicated to delivering high quality and accessible care. If we call to invite you, please book an appointment - a short telephone call could end up saving your life!"

The recent tragic consequences of drink spiking in Laos Thailand serve as a stark reminder of the importance of staying alert and taking basic steps to protect yourself and others when socialising, after 6 young travellers died following suspected methanol poisoning, after they reportedly drank free shots.

Coincidently, these deaths occurred in the same week I was meeting Jess Phillips, Secretary of State for Safeguarding and Violence Against Women and Girls, to discuss the dangers associated with spiking and the government's aspiration of halving violence against women and

girls.From physical and sexual violence to emotional and psychological abuse, women and girls are disproportionately affected by various forms of violence, often leading to long-lasting physical and emotional consequences.

 One particularly alarming trend that has emerged in recent years is the phenomenon of spiking, most commonly this occurs when someone add drugs or alcohol to another person's drink without their knowledge or consent. Spiking can lead to incapacitation, loss of control, sexual assault or other forms of violence.

 Spiking incidents often occur in social settings like clubs or bars or even house parties, where perpetrators take advantage of crowded and chaotic environments to carry out their harmful actions. Spiking someone is abuse and it is a criminal offence. Those responsible can face up to 10 years in prison.

Be Spiking Aware!

· If something doesn't feel right or if you notice someone acting inappropriately, don't hesitate to speak up and seek help from bar staff, security or the Police

If you believe someone has been spiked or is in danger, offer your assistance and support. Encourage them to seek help and ensure they are safe and protected.

 Keep a close eye on your drink. Never leave your drink unattended, even for a brief moment, as this provides an opportunity for someone to tamper with it.

If you need to leave your drink for any reason, ask a trusted friend to watch over it or simply

finish it before stepping away. • Avoid accepting drinks from strangers or leaving your drink unattended in public places, such as bars or clubs.

• Be mindful of the signs of drink spiking, which can include sudden dizziness, confusion, nausea or loss of consciousness. If you suspect that your drink has been tampered with or if you start experiencing unusual symptoms after consuming a drink, seek help immediately by calling 999 or 111.

 If you are attending a social gathering or party, try to stay with a group of friends or trusted individuals to ensure each other's safety and wellbeing

 By following these simple yet effective tips, such as keeping a close eye on your drink, being aware of the signs of drink spiking, looking out for your friends, and reporting suspicious behaviour, you can help prevent future tragedies and help us deliver safer, stronger and more resilient communities. Newton Aycliffe's victory against Bridlington will have warmed up the travelling Aycliffe fans who witnessed it, as a Liam Adamson brace helped Aycliffe continue their playoff pursuit.

The first half saw few chances, although Dean Thexton would have been in the perfect position to shoot in the 24th minute had the referee not blown for a handball. Bridlington's Alex Peterson did have a header from a free kick saved, and a promising free kick wasn't capitalised on by Aycliffe on the cusp of half time. Meaning the first interval finished 0-0.

In the second half, Jack Clarkson was substituted for Liam Adamson, and Adamson's impact was almost instantaneous when Joe Ferguson launched a spectacular long range cross which flew past almost everyone on the field to find the feet of Adamson who sprinted towards goal and fired past Bridlington's Sebastian Malkowski with ease in the 61st minute

It wouldn't be the last time Adamson took advantage of Bridlington's sloppy defending, and it also wouldn't be the last time Ferguson launched a perfect cross. The second goal came a mere seven minutes later, once again seeing Ferguson fire a perfect cross, which found Ethan Wood, who then passed to Adamson who used his skills on the edge of the box to entirely outsmart Bridlington's Sam Kay and fire it low to make it 2-0 in the 68th minute. Ferguson was unlucky not to get on the scoresheet himself when his rocket of a shot hit the woodwork in the 77th minute. Aycliffe would see out the game, which was played in freezing conditions, and claim the three points.

- Thank you to Jess for helping us make sure our children at St. Francis' are kept safe.





My doors are closed for any hedgehogs to be released, even my bigger ones are going nowhere 'til spring, but I always try to make overwintering stressless for them, time out of their cages works especially well for the bigger ones. I have also admitted three little ones recently, they are all doing well, my smallest one came in at 295 grams, thank you Angie for bringing her in, she is far too small to hibernate, she is here with me and doing well.

My rescue runs well because Grange Vets share my passion to help these poor souls, I have managed to admit, diagnose, treat and rehabilitate, 65 hedgehogs this year, they also got released to safer gardens. Thank you Angela, Elaine, Riccardo, Giorgio for everything you do to help me help my poorly hedgehogs

Some hedgehogs don't hibernate, they will still need feeding so please keep the food and water topped up, the one occasion you don't keep the food supply going a hungry hog will need feeding and it won't be there for him which is awful. It's always best to put kibble out for them because the fat grams in the kibble is better, I have put Purina out in my hog box tonight, it has 20% fat content which is brilliant, Grannies Choice have some, they will need as much as possible to survive the harsh winter niahts.

This weekend some crucial fundraising is being done, June and Valerie are at the St Clare's Xmas Fair and on Sunday I will be at the Pioneering Care Centre raising funds. I currently have 26 little mouths to feed and it doesn't come cheap, especially with lots of little hogs in at the moment. I will have leaflets and be there for you, If you have any questions. Can I thank Julia and Peter for their very kind donation, Jackie and John, Janet and also everyone else who have been so kind and donated. I personally know how expensive things are, especially with Christmas coming, but all these prickly babies still need feeding whilst here and I also make sure I clean, refresh and check them twice a day, 5.45am and then again in the evening, my routine is cast in stone.

On Saturday, Aycliffe lights will be switched on and on Sunday 1st the Christmas lights will be switched on by Don at Aycliffe Village, he does a wonderful job and this starts at 4pm. Finally, our hedgehogs have been included in the governments levelling up plan, we won the petition in spectacular fashion, more hedges, hedgehog feeding stations and highways between gardens will be encouraged, we want to put their decline in reverse and, with your help, it can be done. They have awfully challenging lives out there, let's work together to change this please.

PD Jasper didn't have the best start in life - he was found abandoned in a sweltering greenhouse at just seven weeks old last summer. Rescued by a kind lady in Manchester, she soon realised that the Belgian Malinois was extra special.

He had lots of hidden talents that made him an ideal police dog candidate, so he was handed over to our puppy development programme at 11 months. PD Axel found himself in the same sad situation when he was abandoned at 12 weeks old in carboard box outside the Salvation Army, in Darlington.

The fellow Belgian Malinois was whisked off to the vets and soon adopted by Chris, who very quickly discovered that Axel was full of mischief and had a strong character. Again, contact was made with the Durham Police Dog Support Unit and Axel was also accepted into our puppy development programme. The duo started their training course alongside PD Dutch, a German Shepherd who came to the unit at 12 months old from one of our breeders.

All three hit the ground running, jumping straight into the ten-week intensive training course. And last week they all became officially registered police dogs, passing their final assessments with flying colours! PD Jasper, now 18 months, is teamed up with PC Dan Cuthbertson, specialising in general purpose policing. PD Axel, now 14 months, has joined forces with PC Paul Cooper and became the force's youngest licensed police dog. And last, but not least, 14-month-old PD Dutch will now serve with handler, PC Laura Linskey, to hunt out suspects and search for missing people.

In Parliament, I've been working hard to push for more jobs for our town, which will benefit Aycliffe and the wider County. I visited five groups of young people to take their questions about our democracy, local and national issues, and how they can shape their communities. I then visited schools in Windlestone, Trimdon, Spennymoor and then finally I finished at the Newton Aycliffe Scout Centre to chat to the young people about my role and take questions on a range of topics. I was so impressed by all of the young people I met and the quality of the questions they asked. All a real credit to our communities. Thank you to all schools and groups for having me this week. I held my advice surgery in Ferryhill, where it was good to meet with constituents, to talk about various issues and how I can assist as our MP. I want to thank everyone who has taken the time to share their views on this very sensitive topic with me – I've considered all of these views carefully and will take them into account when deciding how to vote.

# Ice Trail Returns to Darlington




A 'wicked' selection of magical ice sculptures are set to be unveiled in Darlington town centre on Saturday 7th December from 11am–3pm.

# An Evening with Meeting the County's **Housing Needs**

Councillors in County Durham will discuss the allocation of social housing when they meet next week.

Durham County Council is proposing a comprehensive review of the process to ensure housing is allocated consistently and fairly to those in the greatest housing need.

A housing allocations scheme is a requirement of all authorities, setting out the council's eligibility, qualifying and housing need criteria, to ensure priority is fairly assigned.

It also sets out how decisions are made on how social housing is allocated and how the council assesses applications to the housing register.

In County Durham, a choice-based allocations scheme currently operates to allocate social housing to people on the housing register, as part of the Durham Key Options partnership.

This is made up of the council and four key housing providers, who all believe a review to be necessary to respond to the current housing crisis and ease the sustained pressure on the supply of social housing. The council hopes to launch a consultation on the policy in the new vear.

This will seek opinions on six key issues, including: the criteria to access the housing register, better use of social housing stock, local lettings policies, the priority of homelessness cases, the priority of medical and domestic abuse cases, and monitoring and service standards.

Housing providers, professionals, key stakeholders and members of the public will be given an opportunity to take part in the consultation. Cabinet will be asked to agree to the allocations policy review and approve a public consultation when it meets next week

If agreed, this will begin on 15th January for eight weeks, ahead of a second consultation starting in the summer.

# **Domestic Abuse Training**

All frontline officers and staff at Durham Constabulary are set to receive specialist domestic abuse training to help protect vulnerable people. Starting next month, the Domestic Abuse Matters (DA Matters) training programme will be rolled out to around 575 frontline officers and staff. The training will be delivered over several months by the specialist domestic abuse charity SafeLives, which developed the programme with the College of Policing.

The aim of the training is to provide 'consistency of service' to those who are experiencing domestic abuse. It recognises the difficult role frontline police play in dealing with domestic abuse and will enable officers to develop and respond to domestic abuse situations and look at changing skills, behaviour and attitudes, by challenging inappropriate language and behaviour.

The training covers areas such as coercive and controlling behaviour, understanding perpetrators, digital domestic abuse, assessing risk, male victims of domestic abuse and abuse involving older people. Domestic abuse and violence accounts for almost 17% of all recorded crimes within County Durham and Darlington and the force deals with around 16,526 incidents each year.

Temporary Superintendent Neil Fuller, from Durham Constabulary, said: "Every incident of domestic abuse is one too many - nobody should have to suffer abuse and violence at the hands of another.

"Our role as police officers and staff is to protect vulnerable people and keep them safe from harm, and we use all powers available to us to do this. Incidents of domestic abuse and violence are among the most complex investigations we deal with, and they require our utmost care and sensitivity.

"DA Matters is a crucial training programme that will complement other work we are carrying out within the force, to enable our officers to gain a better understanding about all areas of domestic abuse and how we can develop and improve our response. This is an opportunity for us to make a direct change to victims and survivors of domestic abuse, and forms part of our commitment to tackling violence against women and

girls." Ellen Miller, Chief Executive of SafeLives, said: "We are pleased to be working with Durham Constabulary and our fantastic team of experienced associate trainers to deliver DA Matters, a cultural change programme created with survivors and designed to create long term, sustainable change.

"We know that Durham Constabulary becoming an adopter force of DA Matters will be welcome news for victims and survivors of domestic abuse, as the programme is designed to increase awareness and understanding of coercive and controlling behaviour and create attitudinal change throughout the entire force. Victims domestic abuse and police officers alike want to know that the criminal justice response to domestic abuse is as good as it can be. Durham Constabulary adopting DA Matters is an important step towards that."


